What We Know So Far

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Transportation

Health and Safety Requirements on the Bus:

- 11 students on the bus at one time - this allows for one student to sit every other seat, one per row
- However, students living in the same household may sit two to a seat
- Students must wear masks at all times while on the bus
- Buses will be cleaned between each bus run

Arrival at School - What to Expect

- Bus Drop-Off - Buses will unload one at a time
- Car Drop-Off - Separate location from buses
- Students (and staff) will have their temperature taken by a staff member as they enter the building
 - Temperature less than 100.0 - student goes to classroom
 - Temperature at or above 100.0 - student waits 5 minutes for a second reading
 - Second reading still at or above 100.0 - students goes to elementary cafeteria to wait for a pick up

Meals at School

Breakfast -

- Breakfast will be handed to students upon arrival into the building (exception will be PreK and K, where breakfast will be delivered to the classroom.)
- Students will eat breakfast at their desk in their classroom.

Lunch -

- Lunch will be delivered to classrooms.
- Students will eat lunch at their desk in their classroom.

Classroom Set-Up

Placement of desks and tables will follow social distancing guidelines

Students may not be required to wear masks during instruction while they are at their seat

Students will need to wear masks when moving throughout the classroom - throwing something in the garbage, using the restroom, getting something from their bookbag, etc.

Minimizing sharing of high-touch materials

Definition of Cohort

A cohort is a pre-assigned, reasonable sized group of students that will stay together for the majority of the day to limit potential exposure to the COVID-19 virus.

This allows us to:

- Limit the number of students on the bus and in the building on any given day while maximizing face-to-face contact with students and teachers
- Limit the amount of intermingling between students
- Supports contact tracing requirements

Spring vs. Fall

How will learning be different this fall from what it was in the spring?

- Assessments / Grading
- Attendance
- Structured daily learning schedule
- Availability of staff for non-emergencies

Definitions of Instructional Models

In-Person - Our traditional model - all teaching and learning happens at school

Hybrid - This model is an approach to instruction that combines face-to-face classroom instruction with online activities.

Remote - This model requires all teaching and learning to occur online. Instruction in this model is provided by a YCS teacher.

Homeschool - This requires that a parent becomes the teacher for their student(s). The parent is responsible for identifying and delivering the content and creating learning activities for their child, not the District.
